REAL Deal News



Once again, the REAL Deal was the place to go for Christmas decorations. The store was successful in moving most of the Christmas items that we had collected over the past year. The trees, decorations, lights, stockings, candles - you name it -sold well from the day they were put out in November. Just a few boxes had to be packed up in January. But we fully expect to have a huge stock again by November, as Christmas

items come in year round as people downsize and their tastes change.

The shrinking of the Christmas collection, and a winter slowdown in donations, gave staff a chance to get the upstairs storage area more organized. Seasonal items (e.g. fall and Easter), over-stocked goods (like books and puzzles) and furniture inventory are stored up there until we need them.

We held our first of what will become a regular offering - a Repurposing Workshop. Twice as many people signed up as we could accommodate, so we are already planning

more. The idea is to bring in some of our regular customers and volunteers, who know how to repurpose items for other use, and have them teach people wanting to

know more. Turn a lamp into a bird feeder, bifold doors into attractive shelves, coffee tables into benches, old lamps into new. Watch for announcements for the next workshops. Volunteers also enjoyed a potluck lunch on December 17, and an Open House for customers, members and volunteers took place December 23rd.

Thankfully, most residents were good about not leaving donations for us over the period December 24 to January 5th, when we were closed. However, there were some potentially useful mattresses that got snowed on and had to be discarded. Please tell everyone you know that we love donations of good quality used items, but only during store hours. Materials that get "dumped" often end up damaged and have to be landfilled. Given that the REAL Deal has to pay for disposal,

we lose two times - in lost revenue from the potential sales and in higher expenses to pay for garbage. Donations have recently started up again in full force, perhaps because people are doing some post-Christmas clean-up of their homes, which is keeping the volunteer sorters hopping.

In February, watch for a sale on chairs of all kinds, and of course, any Valentine's Day themed treasures. You can find out about store promotions form the trailer sign by the road, the REAL Deal page on the website or call the store at 283-7999 and watch the EMC Classifieds. If there is something you have your eye on, please note our "Make a Deal Days". We listened to our customers, and moved Make a Deal Friday back to the last Friday of the month. On those days, you are free to bargain with the manager for a lower price on any item on the floor. But please establish the deal before you arrive at the cash to reduce any confusion or waiting.

Note, especially to out of town visitors: the Abbott St. Bridge will be closed for construction until May 31. So please plan an alternate route for coming to and from the store.

REAL Deal Oddities

You likely know to check the REAL Deal for small appliances, housewares, toys, renovation supplies, furniture and books. But maybe you've never thought to check the store for these (sometimes hard to find) items.

- Craft supplies Winter might be the time to tackle some craft projects. We have odds and ends of craft supplies like ribbon and lace (for making Valentine's), patterns, wood cut outs etc. We are also well-stocked with potpourri at the moment.
- Microwave oven glass turntable platters Find them near the appliances.
- Glass lids for casserole dishes Maybe you've broken one and didn't think it could be replaced. Lids are a good way of retaining heat and reducing your need for foil or plastic wrap.
- Pet items Cages, leashes, feeding dishes, etc.
- Picture frames A never ending supply, many only \$0.25.
- Free stuff some stuff just doesn't sell, or we get too much of it. But it might be just what you need. Most of it is on the tables outside the customer entrance, but there is a small area inside as well

If you can't see what you are looking for, please ask. If we don't have it, we would be happy to add your request to our Wish Book. Things have a habit of showing up just after someone has asked for it, and staff would like to be able to let you know if it comes in.

Drag-A-Bag

You've no doubt discovered that most local retailers are now charging a few cents for plastic bags. Make a point of taking your own plastic or reusable fabric bags whenever you're out and about. Be sure to return the emptied bags to your car so you'll never be



caught without! Or look for lightweight bags that you can keep in your pocket or purse. You may find the reusable bags hold more, are easier to pack, are easier on your hands, or can be put over your shoulder. Using one cloth reusable bag can save up to 6 plastic bags a week or 288 bags a year

Styrofoam Recycling



New industrial technology from Japan may make it possible for more styrofoam to be recycled in Canada. Very few communities accept styrofoam in their recycling programs. In North America, only about 10% of styrofoam gets recycled. Generally, polystyrene (styrofoam is the trademarked name) goes directly to landfill, where it doesn't break down. When burned, it releases toxic gases.

Styrofoam is a petroleum product, made from a natural gas liquid. It's worth about \$2,400 a tonne, and is used mainly for insulation and packaging.

In Japan, most styrofoam is chopped up and melted into "planks", reprocessed into granules and made into a variety of plastic products. A block of the waste Styrofoam is worth \$350 a tonne.

Edmonton and other cities in Alberta are studying the technology to see if the Japanese Electrothermal Densifier would be practical in Alberta. It is estimated that Edmonton alone could keep six such recycling machines busy. Styrofoam makes up about six per cent of the total waste stream, about ten bags a year from the average household. The suggestion would be to ship the planks of recycled styrofoam back to Japan for sale.

One reason that styrofoam recycling is uncommon in North America is it's low weight per volume: About 5% of the product is polystyrene, and the rest is air, so transporting it anywhere is costly. However, there are examples of companies that make it into insulated panels for construction, a company that converts it to pellets for picture frames, car bumpers and plastic brackets, and a company in Vancouver that uses chipped styrofoam in beanbag chairs. But generally it is not a closed loop process, that is, the styrofoam is not made into new styrofoam.

Lug-A-Mug

Take a mug when you are going to events (like meetings, conferences, school) that use plastic, paper or foam cups. You'll reduce waste and save the host of the event the cost of disposables. Many take out establishments will fill your mug if you ask. Some will even provide a discount. (Tim Horton's give a 10 cent discount for using your own mug!) Think of all the waste you will avoid. A two cup a day habit per weekday comes to 520 cups per year. And face it, most things taste better from a real mug. You could probably get them to fill it up with water so you can

avoid those pesky plastic water bottles too!

Need more mugs? Visit Mugs R Us at 85 William St. W. Ceramic mugs are just .25, and they have a good selection of break-resistant commuter mugs, too. If you're on a budget, there are usually lots in the free pile, as well!

Smiths Falls Presentation Highlights Economic Contribution



Sustainable funding is something every non-profit organization dreams of, and REAL is no exception.


Five years ago the Town of Smiths Falls agreed to provide \$1.50 per capita to REAL to support of the REAL Deal Store, which was just getting established. That \$13,500 per year made a big difference in the store's development, which is demonstrated by the REAL Deal's 75% growth in sales.

On January 17, REAL made a presentation to Council asking that the Town renew its support for REAL, at the same \$1.50 per capita rate for four years, and make those funds available to the whole of the organization.

REAL's presentation provided an update on REAL's progress and emphasized the role REAL has played in the economic activity of the region. REAL as an organization employs 7 part-time staff who spend their income locally. REAL has invested \$30,000 dollars in improvements to the 85 William St. facility, using a variety of local contractors for the work. The store has diverted 75,000 kilos from landfills, which at a disposal rate of \$110 a tonne, amounts to over \$8,000 in savings for area municipalities Home energy audits done in Smiths Falls alone have resulted in \$70,000 worth of home energy efficiency grants, and stimulated \$200,000 worth of economic activity. Regionally, they brought in \$470,000 in grants and stimulated \$1.3M in economic activity. Both the ecoENERGY and the Well Aware programs have resulted in business for area contractors. In addition, virtually all of REAL's annual budget of \$175,000 is spent on local stores and services.

REAL is also grateful that the Township of Drummond North-Elmsley has renewed its support to REAL in the amount of \$1,000 per year. Their contribution will be an example to the other neighbouring municipalities our team will be approaching for support in the near future.

Prelude to Christmas Concert a Hit



A good time was had by all at the "Prelude to Christmas" concert by the Central Band of the Canadian Forces on December 8. The band entertained a full house of more than 250 people, including a large contingent of 585 Rideau Squadron Air Cadets, with one of their most entertaining concerts in recent memory. The concert included seasonal favourites, several vocal selections, a bagpiper, and several guest conductors. The

band enjoyed a display of stories and memorabilia from the 12 concerts they have performed for us since 1995. The live auction by John Joynt of the Sens tickets (thanks to Larry and Carol Manson) tickets and John McDermott tickets (courtesy of Performance Printing), added to the evening. A lucky member of the audience won the raffle of a framed sunset water colour by one of our original REAL Board members, Mike Cliffen. Proceeds from the evening reached \$4,000. Thanks to

our patrons, sponsors, stars and the audience for their generous contributions. Special thanks to our concert volunteers, and the organizing committee: Peter Au, Megan Blay, Cathryn Davidson, Betty Davis, Pat Foulkes, Barb Hicks, John Joynt, Brenda King and, Larry Manson. Next year's concert has already been booked for December 7th, 2011.


In REAL Life
