# 141 Enjoy Voyageur Canoe Tours

The 2004 Voyageur Interpretative Tours held July 17 and 18 during the Smiths Falls Chocolate and Railway Festival attracted 141 people. Passengers boarded at the Victoria finger docks where they received their paddling instructions. Tours passed through the Detached Lock on the way to the Swale, a protected wetland in the Rideau Waterway, during the 75 minute trip.

The 51 feedback forms received from passengers immediately following their tour were overwhelmingly positive on the overall experience, education value, and specifically the heritage, cultural and ecological aspects presented. All said they would recommend the tour to friends.

Passengers enjoyed the paddling experience, passing through the lock, seeing the swale, the enthusiastic guides and the camraderie, enhanced by the "Voyageur salute!" The program received donations from seven sponsors: Doug Kilpatrick, Kilmarnock Enterprises, Healey's Transportation, Parks Canada, Rideau Valley Conservation Authority, Smiths Falls Focus Community, and Wills Transfer Ltd. Five patrons reserved a tour for their group: The Chinese Canadian Heritage Cultural Association, Kerr Lighting, REAL, Scotia Bank, and the Town of Smiths Falls. Net proceeds were just over \$800.

Peter Au of REAL coordinated the event, Pam Horsley of the Rideau Roundtable provided the interpretation, and Alex McInnis of the Rideau Outdoor Centre provided the paddling instructions and expertise on the Voyageur (continued inside)

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canoes. The interpretation script was compiled by Pam Horsley with expert advice from Simon Lunn, Paul Hamilton of the Rideau Roundtable, Ken Watson of the Friends of the Rideau, and Todd Carley. (Todd is a former director and summer student with REAL.) The Rideau Canal, Smiths Falls Parks and Recreation and the Canadian Recreational Canoe Association provided facilities. Volunteers from the Rideau Outdoor Centre and REAL contributed greatly to the smooth running of the trips. Thanks to everyone for making the 2004 Voyageur Canoe Tours a success.

The Rideau Roundtable, in association with the Rideau Outdoor Centre and the Rideau Environmental Action League, also ran a series of 75 minute Interpretive Voyageur Canoe Tours in Merrickville on Saturday, August 21. Voyageur canoes departed downtown Merrickville and headed towards the Bird Sanctuary.

Tim Armstrong, the program director of Canadian Recreational Canoeing Association (CCRA), did an awesome job as captain, Voyageur, and interpreter. The participants were all very enthusiastic about the experience, and many would like to see these tours continued.

# The One Tonne Challenge

Here are a couple of fun web-based tools to help Canadians choose actions to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions, and do their bit to reduce human induced climate change.

The Pembina Institute offers the One Less Tonne Tool. It allows users to calculate for each of the 20 actions chosen the emission reductions as well as the money that will be saved through reduced electricity or fuel costs. Go to www.onelesstonne.ca and start clicking!

The One Tonne Challenge was launched recently by the Government of Canada. It calls on each Canadian to reduce his or her annual emissions of greenhouse gases by one tonne, or about 20%. The One Tonne Challenge is part of Canada's Climate Change Plan, the national blueprint for reducing emissions in line with the Kyoto Protocol. Head to www.climatechange.gc.ca/onetonne/English.

The calculator asks you various questions about your driving habits, home and appliances and calculates the number of tonnes of GHG you produce each year. (The average is 5 tonnes). You can then choose various actions and it will give you the number of tonnes by which your emissions would be reduced. Oodles of extra tips are supplied. Both tools are an interesting way to getting people interested in making positive lifestyle changes.

#### Green Communities Association at AGM

Jane Scott and David Poch, Board Directors of the Green Communities Association (GCA), were guests at REAL's AGM held June 22 at the Heritage House Museum. Jane is Director of the City of Ottawa's Water Protection Program, and David is an environmental lawyer living in the Perth area. They gave members a brief Power Point Presentation on the history and role of the GCA.

The GCA is an umbrella organization established in 1995. It has grown since then and is now a national organization with 40 Green Communities across Canada, of which REAL/LLGreen and ecoPerth are two. The organization recently approved a strategic plan that calls for 50 - 100% growth over the next five years, and focuses on water issues, energy conservation (mainly home energy) and green transportation such as the Walking School Bus.

Membership in the GCA provides three main benefits: 1) a collective insurance package, 2) various assistance to local organizations so they are better able to deliver local programs and 3) an avenue to develop larger and sometimes national programs. For example, the Pesticide Free Naturally Program was a program initiated by local Green Communities (GCs), including LL Green, developed by the GCA with ecoSuperior and delivered by member GCs in Ontario. Then it was picked up in other provinces, including Quebec, which led to the province of Quebec banning cosmetic pesticides. LL Green developed a local program a few years ago which has now become the successful province-wide Well Aware program through the GCA, delivered by five other members. Groups in other provinces are now actively looking at adopting Well Aware. In a reverse, LLGreen/ REAL have adopted the Phones for Phunds and the Backyard Burning projects from other Green

Communities. The GCA invites input from its members, offers a free weekly electronic newsletter, and has a website www.gca.ca.

The Friends of the Tay Watershed has won the Rideau Valley Conservation Foundation's Annual Conservation Award for 2003. The annual awards recognize outstanding voluntary achievement in the protection of the Rideau Valley environment.

The Friends of the Tay Watershed was singled out for their contributions to the development, promotion and implementation of the Tay River Watershed Management Plan. In making the nomination, REAL noted all that the Friends has accomplished in just three years. The group has developed pride and a sense of community in the Tay Watershed, and residents look to them for information. It has shown leadership in working with all levels of government on issues of mutual concern and provides a fine example of what a community-based, volunteer organization can accomplish.

An Honourable Mention this year went to Laurie Gadzala and Douglas Frosst of Manotick for the protection of the last 100 metres of remaining natural shoreline on Long Island. The certificates were presented at an RVCA meeting held in Crow Lake Village in Central Frontenac Township June 23.

The Rideau Environmental Action League was the recipient of the Rideau Valley Conservation Foundation Conservation Award in 2001 for 10 years of environmental community leadership.

#### Lake Monitoring Workshop in Perth

The Rideau Valley Conservation Authority (RVCA) invites amateur scientists and lake stewards to a Lake Monitoring Workshop on Saturday Sept. 18, 2004 from 10:30 to 2:30 in the Perth Public Library.

The workshop will focus on macroinvertebrates, or, the bugs that inhabit lakes. These spineless creatures can tell us a lot about the health of the lake. Participants at the workshop will learn how to collect, identify and record their bug findings.

Accompanying RVCA staff will be representatives from Wildlife Habitat Canada (WHC), who have developed a "Knowledge Centre" database as part of their Citizen Science program to help citizens record and share their monitoring findings.

After meeting at the Perth Library, participants will walk to Stewart Park to "dig for bugs" in the river. A light lunch will be served back at the library where participants will learn to identify the creatures and enter the findings into the computer.

#### **Project Feeder Watch**

This fall, Project Feeder Watch (PFW) will be entering its 29<sup>th</sup> year in Ontario. The project uses changes in feeder bird visitation rates to track actual population change in winter birds. For example, a drop in feeder visitation rates by black-capped chickadees in Ontario in 2002-2003 may have been due to West Nile Virus.

PFW participants count the kinds and numbers of birds coming to their feeders every 1-2 weeks

# Recycle Ink Cartridges at Reuse Centre

Here's an easy way to recycle your used printer cartridges. Just bring them to the collection box at the Smiths Falls Reuse Centre. The Canadian Diabetes Association and Ko-Rec-Type® Canada have joined together to promote the recycling of ink jet cartridges through the Diabetes Recycle Ink program. Not only does this conserve resources and redirect waste from landfill, it generates funds for the Diabetes Association.

Currently less than 5% of the 30 million cartridges used in Canada each year are recycled. Cartridges donated to the program are refilled or



remanufactured by Ko-Rec-Type®. Cartridges are thoroughly cleaned, reassembled, refilled and inspected. Every component of the cartridge will either be reused or recycled.

Individuals may also choose to put their ink jet cartridge in a pre-addressed, postage paid envelope and drop it in the mail. Envelopes are available by calling 1-800-268-9955. Corporations may arrange for their cartridges to be picked up from their places of business.

Eligible cartridges include laser toner cartridges, printer toner cartridges and ink jet cartridges. A complete list and other details are available at www.diabetes.ca/section/services/recycleink.asp.

A few businesses in the region offer to refill, and therefore to reuse, your printer cartridges. Check with the local computer store in your area. One business that strictly does cartridge refills is Tim Rombough, 2040 C Rogers Road, in Perth. Call 267-4553.

The Reuse Centre is located at the east end of Johnston Street, and is open Saturdays 9:30 to 12:00 and Wednesdays 1:30 to 4:00.

Leeds and Grenville Residents: September 25<sup>th</sup> is the second of two Household Hazardous Waste Days. Locations are the South Grenville Patrol Garage, County Road #21, east of Spencerville form 8:30 a.m to 11:30 .a.m. and the North Grenville Patrol Garage on County Road 44, south of Kemptville from 1:00 p.m until 4:00 p.m. A Hazardous Waste Day was held at the Frankville/Toledo Patrol Garage and the South Leeds Patrol Garage on Saturday August 28. Residents of Leeds and Grenville and the Town of Prescott (but not the Town of Gananoque or City of Brockville) are eligible.

Some Well Aware visits are still available for this fall. We do not know if we are going to receive funding to continue this program, despite its enormous success. As far as we know, this is the first program to directly address the private well owner in Ontario. Everyone who has had a visit has been enthusiastic about how much they learn about their own water supply -- and that they now have enough knowledge to be empowered. And that's important because in Ontario, we as well owners, are completely responsible for the safety of our own wells and water supplies. Well Aware visits are provided by LL Green.
