# ecoENERGY Retrofit for Homes Bookings Closed

On March 31, the federal government abruptly suspended the ecoENERGY Retrofit for Homes program.

Homeowners who have already booked a home energy audit can continue with the program. The deadline for having the renovations and the postevaluation completed is still March 31, 2011 and REAL encourages its clients to do their work and the post-evaluation as soon as possible to ensure they have access to funds.

However, no new bookings for pre-retrofit audits are being accepted.

The popular program made it possible for homeowners to receive up to \$10,000 in federal and provincial rebates to make energy efficient upgrades to their homes. The retrofit program put money into the local economy, stimulated green jobs, and created energy savings and greenhouse gas reductions. Locally, REAL's ecoENERGY audits have stimulated more than \$800,000 in economic activity for local contractors and building supply stores and provided an average grant of just under \$3,000 per homeowner.

We still await word about whether the Ontario government, which has been matching the federal grants, will continue with the program. Natural Resources Canada has said it would continue to process applications for the provincial partners. # A Whole Lot of People Get "FIT"

We had a terrific response to the "Get "Fit", Go Green and Make Money" sessions in March. The presentations attracted 70 people the first night and 90 people the second, from all across the region. All were anxious to learn about the opportunity for small producers - homeowners, farms, small businesses and community groups to enter the renewable energy market. Though the FIT (> 10 kWh) and microFIT (<10 kWh) programs apply to all renewable energy *(continued inside)* 

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REAL arranged for SWITCH, a non profit sustainable energy association serving southeastern Ontario, to present on the FIT and

microFIT programs on March 10. ecoPerth provided more details on how to determine if microFIT is right for you on March 23. Both presentations were held at the Rideau Canal Museum. Some local suppliers of solar PV products were present both evenings to answer questions before and after the main presentations.

From the participant evaluations, it appears there is a lot of demand for impartial information on these renewable energy technologies out there. REAL is considering how we could help. In addition, the workshop drew some attention to REAL and to the museum. Quite a few people had never heard of REAL before, and many had never been to the museum.

Thanks to the presenters, to the Valley Heartland Community Development Foundation for their financial support of the EMC advertising and refreshments, and to Lisa Bell, the Rideau Canal Manager, for volunteering her time to make the auditorium available to us.

#### Awesome Awning

The bright yellow awning over the customer entrance was just one of the building improvements made with the Trillium capital grant awarded REAL last June. # **REAL Deal Spring Happenings**

# *Lurking in a Marsh near You* by Simon Lunn

Can you name the smallest North American heron found right here in the Smiths Falls Swale? Hint 1: It is half the size and even more secretive than its cousin, the American Bittern. Hint 2: while it occurs widely in the eastern US, Central and South America, it is a **threatened species in Canada**, where it summers in southern Ontario, Manitoba, Quebec and New Brunswick. Hint 3: It is rarely seen, but can be considered an indicator (species) of large healthy wetlands like many of those along the Rideau Waterway.

And the winner is... the very small but quite colourful **Least Bittern**. Weighing in at barely three oz. (50-100 g.), it is a rather stout but short (one foot or 30 cm) tall wading marsh bird. It has long yellow legs and bill, light brown and white stripes on its throat and chest, warm orangebrown along the sides of its body, neck and face, and the male has a black back and head cap.

Least Bitterns live in wetlands - the bigger and quieter the better. In particular, they love cattail marshes with standing water. When hungry, Least Bitterns eat small fish and insects. By straddling reeds, they can feed in deeper water than other herons who usually wade through the water. When alarmed, a Least Bittern freezes in place with bill pointed up and eyes turned forward toward the threat. What's more, they are known to sway their body to match the movement of wind-blown cattails. When nesting, this bittern builds a small platform of vegetation (with a canopy) on the ground or a floating island, lays two to seven pale blue-green eggs, and then relies on the water level not going up too much before the young leave the nest!

So you might ask why we are talking about this little fellow right now. The reasons are straightforward. We know from recent reports that Least Bitterns occur and nest in the Swale. We understand that their populations in North America are declining, and that they have been declared a Species-at-Risk largely because of habitat loss caused by the alteration or draining of wetlands for development and other purposes. So before REAL picks the exact route of a trail or other Environment Centre features behind the REAL Deal Store, it is important to find out if (and how) the Least Bittern is using habitat in the area. If it is, we will adjust our plans to avoid any harmful impact, and then proceed with requesting Parks Canada's approval to continue this next phase of our plans for the property.

Simon Lunn (REAL member and volunteer biologist ) will be making some observations, and inventory work will be undertaken by Parks

Canada during the upcoming spring and summer breeding season. Information on other fauna and flora will be recorded at the same time.

We look forward to learning more about how we can protect the Least Bittern and its fellow inhabitants that live in and



around the Swale. Maybe we will have a new story to tell on the next Voyageur Canoe trip through the area!

# Options for Electronics Recycling Improving

Local options for electronics recycling just got better! As of April 1, depots registered with the Ontario Stewardship Program are now accepting Phase 2

products free of charge. The list is very extensive - you'll be hard pressed to think of something electronic that can't be returned. So



let the spring cleaning begin!

Items accepted are:

- Computer Stuff: desktop, handheld and portable computers; computer peripherals such as monitors, modems, scanners, printers, keyboards, mice, drives etc.
- Music Stuff: amplifiers, equalizers, radios, receivers, speakers, tape player and recorders, tuners, turntables.
- Phone Stuff: telephones (physical and accessories), cell phones, PDAs and pagers
- Viewing Stuff: cameras, digital photo frames televisions, video players, video projectors, video recorders and cameras
- Copiers

The goal of the OES program is to keep more of these electronics from ending up in landfills and to encourage more reuse and recycling opportunities. The steel, glass, copper, aluminum, plastics and precious metals that make up these devices can be recovered and reused to make new products.

Find the depot closest to you by going to dowhatyoucan.ca, choosing electronics, and searching by community or postal code. There are established depots in Carleton Place, Brockville, and Smiths Falls. In Kemptville they are scheduled dates at RD Long Computers. For our readers without internet access, the Smiths Falls depots are:
