Trillium Funds Building Improvements

Some physical improvements to the REAL Deal building will be happening over the next year thanks to a community grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF). The \$15,000 awarded will be used to make a number of changes that will improve the energy efficiency, comfort, and safety of 85 William St. W.



The first renovations will be to replace the three large single pane windows in the store area, add an awning to the customer door, and upgrade the plumbing. The windows will improve energy efficiency and comfort in the store. The awning will be some

protection from the elements for customers, draw attention to the entrance, and double as a sign surface, as the store logo will be screened onto it. The plumbing changes will be the addition of a kitchen sink, laundry tubs and an outside tap. The laundry tub will be a welcome addition as we will be better able to clean larger items, the kitchen sink will be used by staff and volunteers for their refreshments, and the outside tap will be used mostly for gardening. (After we use the water from the rain barrel, of course!) Other renovations to be undertaken with this funding are to improve the sealing around the three garage doors, to level the floor in the loft storage area to improve safety, and replace windows in the office area to improve energy efficiency.

The grants became public August 4. Over \$1.3 million was awarded to non-profit organizations in the Quinte, Kingston and Rideau area. REAL has twelve months in which to do the renovations.

Raised Box Garden at the REAL Deal by Tammy MacKenzie

The REAL Deal Store and Environment Centre had a bit of land staked off in front of the building for a garden, which last summer was found to have a serious disadvantage: it is lowlying and borders a very wet meadow. Moist soil is great for flowers and vegetables, but constantly waterlogged earth is an altogether different story! A dense gravel and clay layer about four inches below the surface meant that water would pool and continue to saturate the soil in the area even if it was mounded.

Money is tight in a non-profit organization with a lot on the go, so purchasing landscaping materials to build a raised garden was not a justifiable option, and, in the end, would not serve to promote the ideal of re-use and recycle. With that in mind I ventured to the back of the store where various construction and renovation materials are kept, and found just what I needed: a fair number of 2" x 2" lengths of wood about 3 feet long (no paint or stain!), and a small pile of gravel.



The ground was prepped by digging out the good top soil, and then the lengths of wood were stacked and secured with stakes along the outer sides. The resulting boxes were filled in with 6 inches of gravel, covered with the previously removed soil and mushroom compost, and a thick layer of newspaper 2-3 inches below the surface. The gravel would keep water from wicking up into the raised soil and saturating it, and the newspaper would keep it from drying out too fast and help prevent weeds from rooting. Three raised boxes were built in this fashion, with a glass pane in one so that the layering can be seen, and a sign posted explaining how the beds were built. Another round bed was built with stones found at the edge of the parking area: a nice, more natural and permanent alternative to wood.



I brought tomato and pumpkin plants from home, Sue Brandum contributed some potatoes, and the Garden Market kindly donated hot and bell peppers, and a variety of flowers.

The garden was put in quite late - the latter half of July - and the weather was cool and wet, but other than the tomatoes, which have done poorly all over, our garden has thrived! We have not watered through the warm, dry weather that finally arrived, and weeding has been minimal – low growing wild purslane took hold but was left to provide surface shelter (helping to retain moisture) and because it is a great vegetable in it's own right, tasty and a source of vitamins A, C, E and omega-3 fatty acids.

The potatoes are lush, the peppers burgeoning, and the flowers blooming. And it was all done with recycled materials at hand!



Book Now for ecoENERGY Well Aware Well in Hand

Cool falls nights signal the increase in calls for ecoENERGY assessments, as homeowners seek to improve the energy efficiency of their homes. As of the first week of September, visits by Alan Leonard, our licensed energy advisor, are being booked for late October. Remember, you must have the ecoENERGY assessment done before the contractors begin their work in order to be eligible for the provincial and federal rebates. Homeowners have 18 months after the initial assessment to have the work done, and with the ecoENERGY program scheduled to end in March 2011, that window of opportunity will be shortened the longer you wait to book.



We had a great response to the Well Aware REAL Actions column in the EMC August 6. Consequently, Angela Northfield, our certified water guide, is fully booked to do Well Aware visits through the fall. If you haven't made contact with the Environment Centre, please do so. A list of interested well owners will be helpful if we get the opportunity to extend the program. In the meantime, we will be happy to answer any questions you have about your well or septic system and provide a Well Aware kit even if we cannot schedule a guided visit.

Avoiding PVC in School Supplies from the Environmental Defence Fund

PVC (polyvinyl chloride), also known as vinyl, contains chemicals that can cause a range of adverse health effects, including developmental disorders and damage to the liver, central nervous, respiratory and reproductive systems.


Canada recently announced that it will set limits on phthalates in vinyl toys and products such as teethers and rattles. However, the limits do not affect children's school supplies and other phthalate-containing PVC products used or worn by children.

The good news is there are lots of school supplies that don't use PVC.

The US-based Center for Health, Environment and Justice (CHEJ) has a handy printout guide to help you choose safer, PVC-free supplies: www.environmentaldefence.ca/reports/PVC_free _2009.html It provides guidelines for art supplies, backpacks, clothing, lunch boxes and foodwrap, three-ring binders, notebooks and paperclips. But you can follow this general advice:

- Look for non-plastic products whenever possible
- Steer clear of products labelled with the words "vinyl" on the packaging (e.g., vinyl 3-ring binders)
- Don't purchase products with the #3 recycling symbol, or with the letters "V" or "PVC" underneath the recycling symbol (remember that bad news comes in #3's, don't buy PVC)
- Call or email the manufacturer or retailer and ask what type of

plastic their product is made of if you are uncertain - you have a right to know.

Biking and Walking Get a Thumbs Up

Ontario Healthy communities reported these interesting facts from Go for Green 2004 in their Spring Summer newsletter:

- 82% of Canadians want to walk more
- 66% want to bike more
- 70% agreed that if they had a bike lane taking them to their workplace in less than 30 minutes, they would definitely use it
- 80% support government spending on bike lanes and paths in their communities
- 66% of Canadians live within a 30 minute walk of a routine destination and 80% are within a 30 minute cycle
- 25% of all trips are 1 mile or less but 75% of these trips are made by car.

Earth Overshoot Day

Some day about mid September will be Earth Overshoot Day - the day we start living beyond our ecological means.

The concept is that we are using nature in excess of what it can provide - using resources faster than they can regenerate and creating waste faster than it can be absorbed. We went into overshoot first in 1986. By 1996 Earth Overshoot Day fell in November, and the date has been getting progressively earlier every since. In 2008, Earth Overshoot Day was reached September 23.

This day is calculated by comparing our total Ecological Footprint to the biocapacity that nature can regenerate in that year. For more details see www.footprintnetwork.org.

Drop by REAL's Environment Centre to **borrow a Kill a Watt Meter**. Use it to measure the electrical consumption of appliances that plug into a standard 120 VAC, three-prong electrical outlet, including the phantom loads of appliances that remain in standby mode. REAL also makes the devices available at the Almonte, Perth and Smiths Falls Public Libraries. It is advisable to call ahead to ensure one is available.
