Grants Still Available for Renovations

Despite the sudden withdrawal of the federal government from the ecoENERGY for Homes grant program, the Ontario government is still providing grants.

If you're planning renovations this fall, now is the perfect time to get an energy audit. Ontario grants are expected to conclude in March, 2011, giving you enough time to get the first audit, do the work, have the second verifying audit and be finished in time to claim the grants. Grants are available for insulation, air sealing, furnaces, wood stoves, low-flow toilets, windows, and other items. To find out more go to Ontario Home Energy Savings.

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We're also pleased to announce that Alan Leonard, our auditor, will soon be certified to audit Multiple Unit Buildings and Multiple Unit Residential Buildings. Alan is also qualified to do small commercial and institutional buildings of under approx. 6,000 sq ft. This can be very useful for non-profits which don't necessarily know where to begin to save on their energy costs and to apply for funds for energy retrofits.

Jones Falls a REAL Learning Event

New and nearly new volunteers got together in a big yellow bus on Sunday, Aug. 22 for a trip to Jones Falls, a lockstation on the Rideau Waterway. New volunteers attended to learn about the possibilities volunteering with REAL and the Rideau Canal Museum. They and the nearly new volunteers learned about the link between cultural and natural heritage. Those in attendance were treated to a demonstration by a real blacksmith working the irons and telling tales of the past. The group experienced the Whispering Dam where voices over 100 feet away can be heard due to the shape and height of the structure. The light lunch and bus transportation were free to the participants. New recruits will soon be helping REAL and RCM achieve their goals of cultural and environmental protection and promotion.

They're also spending two days a week working in the REAL Deal.



REAL Deal Specials and Requests

As the REAL Deal Reuse Store goes into its fourth year, it is proving to be a huge community success. In fact, just about too successful. We have struggled all summer and continue to struggle to accept and store all the worthy donations that people want to give us.

Effective storage upstairs will soon be ready. We had first to make the floor safe and secure, and then erect solid, steel shelving. We bought one carport tent for the back area, providing additional shelter for furniture that can't get wet. The removal of the oil tank has provided a little additional storage space for small items. And, we're still working on getting a proper shelter built for the windows and doors.

But, even with all this additional storage, we're still full to the rafters. So, we're asking donors to hold onto their planned donations of large items -- like stuffed chairs, couches, and tables -- for a

month or so, until we've sold some of our inventory. And, with people switching to flat screen TVs, we've added entertainment units to our "do not accept" list.



However, we're in need of screen doors, bird cages, single beds, mixing bowls and other baking and canning supplies.

Our special sales for the month of September are 50% off small kitchen appliances such as coffee makers, toasters, toaster ovens, griddles, sandwich makers, etc. and 50% off sinks for those bathroom and kitchen renovations.

Bottle Drive Nets \$600

REAL's first ever bottle drive the weekend of July 23 and 24 was a very rewarding one! Just over \$600 was collected for REAL's environmental projects. About a



dozen volunteers took two hour shifts at the Beer Store on a very hot Friday and Saturday. People returning their empty alcohol beverage containers to the store were asked if they would like to donate them to their local environmental organization, REAL, and thankfully many did. The volunteers would then sort the returns and take them into the store for cash. The Saturday 10 - 12 shift turned out to be the most profitable. Thanks to volunteer feedback, we have several ideas to improve our results next year. Our sincere appreciation to the staff of The Beer Store for making this possible and the public who contributed to this fundraiser. We couldn't have done it without our stellar volunteers. Christmas Band Concert



Communal Garden Gets A (Green) Thumbs Up

Our communal garden "experiment" has been growing well! If you've come by the REAL Deal you will see that the four plots have been very productive, helped no doubt by the great soil mix we started with.

The youth from Big Brothers Big Sisters and the Smiths Falls and District Club for Youth have really enjoyed spending time at the garden, as well as sampling the produce! REAL Deal staff and volunteers have already been enjoying the cherry tomatoes, basil, broccoli, green beans, various peppers and radishes in the "REAL Veggie Patch". Tomatoes appear to have been the most rewarding crop of the four groups involved. A highlight of the summer was the "Veggies and You" workshop held at the Community Health Centre (see story below).



No major insect, pest, vandalism or drought difficulties have surfaced. We have had some water pooling on the north side of the plots after a heavy rain. And it is possible that some tomato plants were either getting too much moisture or need to be more spread out. It doesn't look like the straw bale forms will be usable a second year, other than as compost. But nothing that the garden teams can't handle.

Later in the fall decisions will need to be made on whether to install additional plots for the 2012 garden season and how to fund the project. We are very appreciative of the generous funding from an anonymous family foundation that kick-started this year's communal garden. REAL would still welcome a volunteer to champion the communal garden. If you as an individual, family or community group would be interested, please contact us as soon a possible. Next year we will likely try raised wooden beds.

Veggies and You

About twenty people involved in the communal garden project, primarily youth, gathered at the



Community Health Centre (CHC) one afternoon in late August for some lessons on making use of the vegetables grown in their gardens. Since many of our garden participants were new to gardening, the garden committee felt some additional instruction would be beneficial.

The group learned how to tell when to harvest their vegetables and store them, and sampled some fresh herbs. Then the group divided into teams to get cooking! Fresh tomato salsa, tomato sauce, stuffed peppers and wilted swiss chard were on the menu. Everyone got to sample the results and take home a container of tomato sauce. Participants enjoyed cooking in the CHC's wonderful new kitchen, and had ideas for other possible food information sessions.

Our thanks to Mona Wynn, Community Health Promotor, Jana Plaunt, Dietician, and Megan Burns, Student Dietician, for planning and running the workshop. Perth Passes Anti-Idling Bylaw

Perth Town Council did the right thing by adopting a controversial anti-idling by-law on August 31. Most councillors supported the bylaw in principle, but had issues with the enforcement or wording.

The bylaw was promoted by ecoPerth and the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW). At their request, REAL sent a letter of support to Mayor Fenik and Council encouraging them to pass the bylaw.

This is not the first time an anti-idling bylaw has come before council. ecoPerth first began pushing for an anti-idling bylaw in 2001, and the CFUW lobbied council in 2006-007.

Idling is simply not necessary. Engines do not need to be warmed up before driving, and ten seconds of idling uses more fuel than restarting an engine. An idling vehicle sends unnecessary pollutants into the air, contributing to smog, acid rain and climate



change. Deteriorating air quality directly affects the health of vulnerable populations: seniors, children and those with respiratory problems. And idling wastes gas, which costs drivers money.

For three years, REAL conducted an education program about idling and encouraged drivers stopped at the lock crossings in Smiths Falls and Merrickville to turn their vehicles off when waiting for the locks to change. We made some progress – most people would turn their vehicles off when we approached and asked them to. And

most learned in turning their vehicle off that it was not hard to do.

REAL had 30 Idle Free Zone aluminum signs made up, which struck a chord with many. Some of the signs are on the REAL Deal building, some were provided free to local schools, some were purchased by the Town of Smiths Falls, and others put up in Merrickville. Following a mention of the signs in the Green Communities Canada newsletter, we had requests from all over the country.

But, while public education on the futility of idling helps, most people do not continue with these good practices on their own. To achieve a genuine shift in habit, people need to know that society as a whole has said it is the wrong thing to do. Municipalities must pass anti-idling bylaws to get this firm message across.

The Town of Perth will undertake a six month public education campaign, with ecoPerth, CFUW and Canada World Youth (CWY) assisting. Enforcement will begin in July 2011. The fine will be minimal, just \$8.00, but no minimum idling time will be allowed. The bylaw will be enforced by the local parking authority on Town-owned property eg. parking lots, parking spaces and driveways. Some exceptions, for example for emergency vehicles, will apply.

REAL is encouraged that the Town of Perth is setting an example for other Lanark, Leeds and Grenville municipalities. Merrickville already has anti-idling rules. Could Smiths Falls be next?
